FIVE YEARS AND COUNTING

hen I was first asked to write an article for the Alumni, Family & Friends Newsletter, I was very excited. But what could I possibly say that hasn't already been said? While turning through the pages of our Blue-Gold scrapbook, I realized that my daughter, Ashley Webb, has been with the program for five years.

When Ashley was almost two years old, I began to notice she was not performing age-appropriate tasks. Although developments were still being made, it was clear that she was having difficulty meeting benchmarks. After multiple visits to specialists, a chromosomal abnormality was discovered. It was

during this time that we found the Delaware Foundation Reaching Citizens with Intellectual Disabilities (DFRC). They have become a saving grace for our family.

It is hard to believe this will be Ashley's fifth year as a buddy in the Blue-Gold Hand-in-Hand program. At eight years old, Ashley became a participant in this program in 2003. Upon signing her up, we had no expectations whatsoever. Little did we know what a wonderful impact this would have on our family on so many levels.

Through the Hand-in-Hand program, our family has found support and lifelong friends. Ashley has built social skills, has found comfort with her peers, and has made friendships that will last a lifetime.

ALL IN THE FAMILY

s a high school senior in 1979, my husband, Ed Testa, was chosen as a Blue Player in the Blue-Gold Football game. His buddy's name was Bill. He also became friends with a young man named Mike Luternau who was one of Bill's friends from Mary Campbell Center. Ed will tell you that to this day, when the buddies run out on the field at the game, he still cries like it was yesterday. It was by far one of the most memorable experiences of his life.

For our family, the Blue-Gold journey began in 1990. At 5-yrs. old, my niece, Elena Tadlock, was given the opportunity to be a buddy in the Hand-in-Hand program. Elena has a rare non-hereditary disorder called Prader-Willi syndrome. It is caused by an abnormality on the 15th chromosome. Individuals with Prader-Willi characteristically have low muscle tone, short stature, low IQ, and a chronic feeling of hunger coupled

with a very slow metabolism. For Elena to be given this special opportunity meant a great deal to us all, but

especially to Ed.

That first year, Elena was paired with an Ambassador named Stephanie from St. Elizabeth High School. Since then, with the exception of one year, her buddies have continued to be from St. Elizabeth. As the years went on and our sons attended St. E's for high school, the students who took part in the Blue-Gold game were kids we knew. It was so special for our sons to see Elena at events at school with their friends.

In 2007, our younger son Michael was called into Coach Hemphill's office and given the news that he had been chosen to play in the Blue-Gold All★Star Football game. Needless to say, there were celebrations in both the Testa and the Tadlock

households. A few weeks after the participant orientation, the Hand-in-Hand paperwork came in the mail. Michael and Elena had made a pact to open their letters together. What we didn't know was that Mike had talked to the Hand-in-Hand coordinators at orientation and had requested Elena as his buddy. When they opened their

letters and Elena saw that she had been chosen as the Blue All★Star Buddy and her cousin Michael was her very own "Blue Football Player," she was thrilled! That was just the

start of our celebrations. Our entire family took part. A banner was made, shirts were made, tickets and ads were sold. and a tailgate party was planned.

Seeing Michael and Elena together for the events was amazing. The DFRC staff made us all feel like family. The moment the "spark" occurred for me was when Michael's name was announced at the game. With thirty of our friends and relatives in the stands cheering, Michael — wearing his father's #75 game jersey — ran through the goal posts and onto the field. His own special All★Star buddy then ran onto the field with hugs for her own special Blue football player.

I would like to give a special thank you to the DFRC

organization and staff. Elena has had the opportunity to compete in Special Olympics, Hand-in-Hand, and Totally Awesome Kids along with other beneficiaries of the DFRC organization. As a recruited member of the Committee this year, I hope my family can come full circle and give back to an organization who means so much to so many.

Jemember the spark, honor the legacy.

In 1955, while watching a baseball game in Rockford Park, Bob Carpenter & Jim Williams were discussing ways to help Delaware's children with intellectual disabilities. According to a 1980 News Journal article, one asked, "Why not have a benefit football game?" That was the spark that ignited the game, and once having the idea there was no turning back. Hundreds of Delaware families joined in fanning the spark that started as a simple benefit football game to become the spectacular DFRC Blue-Gold Football Game of today.

Then in 1961, Bob Andrus, the Gold Head Coach from Dover High School, selected five of his players to play in the Blue-Gold Game scheduled for August. I was delighted to be selected because it was an opportunity to play another game of football before I joined the Navy.

Admittedly, I did not fully understand the purpose of the game until the kids arrived at one of our practices. It was then that we all began to understand that it was much more than just a football game. Playing with the children I met that day reinforced one

of my grandparents' teachings — you cannot tell a book by its cover. Labels mean nothing. It is the character of the person, not the label, that truly matters.

It was on that day that I joined the DFRC family, a family with a purpose of raising awareness and funds to enrich the lives of Delaware citizens with intellectual disabilities. The years since have reinforced my conviction that our human differences are a part of our human existence, and that once we understand these differences, we do not need to be separated by them.

Now, so many years later, I have the privilege and honor to serve as Chairperson for this, our 54th game. As we prepare for the game on June 20th, I've asked all

of our volunteers to remember the "spark" that brought them to the DFRC family. For many, like me, it was the experience as a participant that left them wanting more. Others have been drawn to DFRC because either they or a family member have benefited from many of the programs DFRC helps support. And let's not forget about the hundreds of volunteers who join us on game day out of a desire to be part of a Delaware tradition that has continued to bring joy to others for over 50 years.

I encourage all of our Alumni, Family, and Friends to remember their own DFRC "spark" and to share that memory with someone who is not as familiar with our cause. In doing so, you will be "honoring the legacy" created with that very first game in 1956!

Homes For Life Foundation

In 1972, my husband Lanny and I were blessed with our second son, Robert. Due to a birth injury he was left with significant neurological problems including an intellectual disability. As he grew and developed we realized that having a child with a disability added another dimension to parenthood. Most parents assume that as their children reach adulthood they will become self-sufficient. If you talk to any parent of a child with a disability most will say that their greatest fear is the future. What will happen when I am no longer here? I realized quite early that a part of the solution was for Robert to live in a group home with his peers, have a job, and be an active member of his community. Recognizing this need, in 1989 I began fund-raising to build a group home for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

In 1980, serendipitously, my then next door neighbor invited me to become involved with a very special fundraiser called Holidazzle which raised money for DFRC. She knew that we had a child with an intellectual disability and thought I might be interested. Not only did I enjoy working on the committee but I met many wonderful women. Coo Murray, whose father was the founder of DRFC, and Mary Boyer were two of the original Holidazzle team.

Over the next nine years I stayed actively involved with the Holidazzle committee. When Coo and Mary heard of my plan to build a neighborhood group home they suggested that I submit a grant proposal to DFRC. In 1989 my request to DFRC for \$30,000 was approved. That initial contribution was the catalyst for a remarkable journey for our family. By the end of 1989, in addition to the DFRC Grant, I had raised \$65,000.

In February 1990 another serendipitous thing happened. I had the good fortune to meet our new neighbors, Julie and Charlie Cawley. Charlie, former Chairman and CEO of MBNA

America Bank, overheard a conversation I was having about my efforts and invited me to meet with him at MBNA to discuss my project. To my amazement and delight Mr. Cawley not only offered to donate the remainder of the funding to complete the first group home, but also to hire the four young women who moved into that home four months later.

Little did I know then that this would become my life's work. Because of the extraordinary generosity of this community, now 20 years later, I am completing my 25th group home.

In 1994 Robert moved into his group home with three other young men and began working for MBNA, now Bank of America. The DFRC family has always been one of my greatest supporters.

Thirty-six years ago I was a frightened young mother wondering what the future would hold. Serendipity brought our family to our neighborhood. When I first started this fund-raising journey on behalf of adults with developmental and intellectual disabilities, I never imagined where it would take me or what wonderful people I would meet along the way. For me, life's great irony is learning that although we start out by simply wanting to care and provide for our own very special children, we discover that to do so we must embrace every child.
